Student Information Admission (Personal Academic) 4. Fees Structure Segregated Online Deposits by students 5. Tabulation of Marks for Examinations (College University Examinations) 6. Online Students' Feedback System 7. Employees Personal, Academic, Promotions Leave Record maintenance 8. Online Alumni Registration Key Features of the System: 1. Every user will have to authenticate them before using this software. Every addition, modification and deletion of any record will be preserved with userid and timestamp. 2. Administrator will be able to create unlimited user groups for different security level. Admin may create unlimited users and every user interface (aka form) and every action button on those forms may be individually blocked for specific user group. 3. Singleclick synchronization with online/offline database (Students' data/ Online Payment) 4. Records on every entity (viz. course, student, teacher, staff, exam, fees, etc.) will

have separate extensive search facility on numerous criteria (like date range, value range, specific option, process state, etc.) for all possible attributes. The search result after joining all master slave relations will be displayed on screen and may be exported to Excel for customized printing of report. 5. The database will automatically be backed up periodically. There will have facilities for previewing any backup in real mode without changing the current data. Any backup may also be restored for replacing the current data (if corrupted). 6. Login time, logout time node name will remain saved for each user. Node will get synchronized with server time at every login.

Drafting of Master Routine of the educational institutions is the most important part of curriculum planning. This is to be done at the beginning of each semester. The Routine Sub Committee of the Teachers' Council collects inputs from all the departments and carefully drafts the Master Routine semester wise, section wise, program wise and department wise. The respective routine of each department is then distributed through the HODs. Master Routines are displayed on the college website as well as the college notice board. Each and every department conducts meeting to allocate classes and teaching assignments to all faculty members for the particular semester, and further meetings are also held from time to time to review the progress and keep record of curriculum planning. Theoretical, Practical and Tutorial classes are regularly held as per guidelines and directives of affiliating university. In addition to regular classroom activities; field studies, educational tours, special remedial classes, students' seminars, invited lectures, parent-teacher meeting are also included in the Curriculum Planning effectively. E-resources have an important role in this mechanism to fulfill the educational objectives.
