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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Narasinha Dutt College is one of the reputed co-educational heritage institution of Howrah district of West Bengal, at the doorstep of celebrating its century. Being reaccredited by NAAC in the second cycle in 2016, the institution is also a proud recipient of RUSA 2.0 fund. The college was established in 1924, with the initiative of Late Sri Suranjan Dutt, son of famous philanthropist Sri Narasinha Dutt, in the residential building of late I. R. Belilious. Institution had started the journey under the leadership of the first Principal Professor Motilal Chatterjee and renowned scholar late Professor Jnanendranath Sen, as the Vice-Principal. The college is affiliated under University of Calcutta. Presently, the college offers 21 undergraduate and 2 post-graduate programs. A total of 122 full-time teachers and 18 guest teachers are actively engaged in teaching for more than 3000 students in three streams under Day and Evening shifts. In tune with the recent global developments, the college has recently introduced Value Based Education, a programme framed for developing the human values in the students. The college publishes two research journals namely “NDC E-BIOS”(E-journal on Biological Sciences) and “JOCAS” (a multidisciplinary journal for Humanities, Science and Commerce). Despite being located in congested industrial area, the college campus has a freshness of atmosphere with green environment consisting of many old trees, bits of gardening, medicinal plant garden, water body and a play-ground. The Campus Development Subcommittee looks after the maintenance of the college campus.

- Lack of seminar hall and auditorium facility.
- Insufficient class rooms and computers for students.
- Financial constraints have held back efforts of maintenance and development.
- During heavy monsoon, water logging and transport problem.

- Vacant staff positions among Non-Teaching employees.

- As many students are from economically backward families, they have to supplement family income by working part-time which results in poor attendance.
- Space crunch and the condition of the administrative block prove to be a hindrance in smooth execution of many developmental activities.
- To arrange for better atmosphere of study for poor and backward class students.
- Efforts to maintain the campus pollution free from the industrial waste of surroundings.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The College affiliated to the University of Calcutta implements the curriculum at UG and PG level in accordance to the syllabus and academic calendar designed by the university. Several sub-committees working under the guidance of IQAC look after the entire process.
- Teaching faculties of the college those are members of Undergraduate Boards of Studies of different subjects directly or indirectly involved in curriculum designing/planning.
- All faculty members participate in the evaluation of answer scripts of the University examinations. In addition, considerable number of teachers are involved in question paper setting, moderation etc. in each semester for University examinations.
- Orientation classes at the departmental level are held at the outset of each semester to explain the

curriculum, course and programme outcomes and methodologies of teaching/learning and evaluation to the students.

- Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is conducted as per university curricula to monitor the overall academic progress of the students.
- In addition to regular classroom activities; field studies, educational tours, special remedial classes, students' seminars, invited lectures, parent-teacher meeting are also included in the Curriculum Planning effectively.
- A MoU has been signed with Sector Development Council for vocational course on security training.
- The Value Education Cell of IQAC has taken initiative to develop human values by online webinars, video and booklet publication for circulation among students.
- The college takes special cares to implement prescribe project works wherever applicable as mentioned in the CBCS curriculum.
- The institution obtains feedback on the academic performance and ambience of the institution from students and parents regularly for the improvement in quality of teaching and academic activities.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Learning levels of the slow, average as well as advanced students are assessed through class-room teaching exercises, class-tests and mentoring. Special classes/lectures and necessary mentor care are arranged for these target groups. Issues relating to the slow as well as advanced learners are also discussed in the parents teachers interface.
- The average student-full time teacher ratio was 26:1 in 2021-2022, 23:1 in 2020-2021 and 33:1 in 2019-2020. The appointments of the State Aided College Teachers (SACT) have improved the ratio in recent years.
- The teachers use ICT tools extensively for both theoretical and practical classes. Especially since the pandemic period the use of modern e-learning platforms like Google Meet, College website, WhatsApp, youtube, etc. has greatly increases in our institution. College library has also introduced the online "E-Documents Delivery Services" to add on the process. All these efforts kept the teaching learning and evaluation process uninterrupted even during the pandemic period.
- The college adopts student centric methods, such as experiential learning for lab-based subjects, project work, field-trips, industry visits, departmental seminar, learning through participation in various programmes, and problem-solving methodologies for enhancing their learning experiences.
- Regular mentor-mentee interactions in each subject are carried out for the solution of academic and related topics with confidence.
- The evaluation guidelines provided through time-to-time circulars/notices of University of Calcutta are strictly maintained by the institution.
- Different committees are formed with the in charge of examination to conduct the examination following timetable provided by college or university accordingly.
- The internal assessment which is taken by the college is a part of the final examination. For the COVID - 19 pandemic, the full internal assessment evaluation for even and odd semester was conducted online.
- The students are made aware of the program and course outcome during the orientation program on their first day of commencement of classes in every semester, by the faculty of the department. Throughout the year the faculty records the performance of each student on each programme outcome.
- The college through departments keeps track of the progression of the students to further studies or employment.

- Online Students Satisfaction Survey (SSS) is conducted and analysed.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The institute encourages teachers to apply for research grants, participate in national and international seminars and presents their research works.
- Certain amount of fund has been allocated by the institution to provide financial assistance to the interested teachers of the college to carry out their research works.
- The institution has a separate Research and Development committee to promote research activities.
- Teachers regularly submit research proposals and research and development committee recommends proposals after academic scrutiny.
- Research and development committee takes special effort in encouraging especially the young faculties to carry out advance research works in college.
- The institution is successfully publishing its research journal JOCAS from 2018 (four volumes so far). The journal has qualified all the necessary steps required for ISSN number and is expecting to get ISSN shortly.
- In addition, in 2020-21 the first volume of an online annual periodical journal for biological sciences NDC E-BIOS was published.
- During 2017 – 2022, the college has received a total grant of Rs. 21.29 Lakhs for 14 research projects from Government (UGC & Department of Science, Technology & Bio-Technology, Govt of WB & College) including 10 UGC minor projects and 2 R&D projects funded by DST&B, Gov. WB.
- Four faculties from the Institution are Ph. D. Guides and six students registered under them.
- The institute has organised a Webinar on IPR on 21st February, 2021.
- Number of research papers published by the faculty members in Journals during 2017 - 22 is 159.
- Number of books and chapters in edited volumes/books published and papers published in national/international conference proceedings during 2017 – 22 is 103.
- The institute has conducted 104 Seminars/conferences/workshops/webinars during 2017- 2022.
- NSS, NCC cadets, St. Johns Ambulance and nursing division of the college are regularly engaged in extension activities.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- To ensure and sustain quality in higher education, infrastructural facilities have always been considered as an important area of concern of this institution. The college has classrooms (50 of which 11 with ICT facility), teachers' room, washrooms for students, male, female faculty members and physically handicapped washrooms, laboratories for relevant subjects, library, seminar libraries, conference room, student's common room, computer laboratory, office of Maulana Azad National Urdu University study centre
- Most of the departments have computer facilities. The whole campus is Wi-Fi enabled
- The Audio-Visual Room is equipped for interactive presentation
- The college library has digitalized library system.
- The College Office is also fully equipped with desktop computers, printers and internet services and connected with different web based applications available.

- The College is performing well in football, volleyball, athletics and gymnastics for many years. It has a playground for outdoor games and Annual Sports.
- The college has a Gymnasium equipped with the necessary instruments.
- The seminar and cultural subcommittee of college organizes different programmes and activities on various occasions and encourages students and staff to actively participate in them.
- The institution has a partially automated (ILMS software :KOHA) Central Library holding about 45000 books and Journals, Newspapers and many rare books. The central library has subscription for N-List, through a huge number of journals can be accessed. Library has also a well decorated and air conditioned Reading Room cum conference room for teachers. Departments have their own seminar library as well.

Student Support and Progression

Our institution has a strong belief in the empowerment of students and their skill development. We try our best to provide services to students from diverse backgrounds, especially from socio-economically disadvantaged strata. Various types of government and non-government scholarships, concessions, fee waivers and financial assistance through private philanthropists are provided to the students. Around 35% of students had benefited from scholarships, freeships, etc. during the last five years. The student support related information are regularly displayed and updated on college website. The institution has taken initiatives for skill enhancement of students which include digital ethnography, scientific presentation, etc. College has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases through Internal Complaint Cell, Anti-ragging and Anti-sexual Harassment Cell, whose email ID are displayed across the institution for easy access along with a drop box to receive the complaints accordingly. The Grievance Redressal Cell has been formed to know the grievances of the students and ensure proper addressal by the concerned authority. The College also has Career Counselling and Placement Cell to help the students to get quality placement opportunities. A number of students from the college qualify in state/ national/ international level examinations like JAM/CLAT/NET/ SLET/ GATE, etc. every year and proceed for higher education.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution is ably guided by the Governing Body constituted keeping in norms with the guidelines of the state Government. Principal executes the internal administrative and academic decisions. The philanthropic, extension and outreach activities of the college are conducted under the guidance of the Principal. The activities are conducted through various committees, subcommittees and cells of the college. The overall guidelines are formulated in consultation with Governing Body. The financial expenditure is regulated by Governing Body. Once the Bursar certifies the expenditure, Principal disburses the amount after the cheque is ratified by the President of the Governing Body, Government nominee and Principal. Principal oversees the overall management of the administrative section through multiple sections and overall oversees and acts as a leader of the teaching faculties comprising of substantive teachers and state aided college teachers (SACT) and administrative section comprising of office and technical staff. All the policies and regulatory framework of the college are in compliance with directorate of Higher Education, Govt of West Bengal, UGC and NAAC guidelines.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Best practices are the activities adopted by the institution, for better effectiveness to achieve the mission. The

best practices of our college are basically focused on different environmental and social activities, some of which are as following:

1. Institutional activities for overall social well-being and social harmony:

Institution regularly conducts activities for social well-being and social harmony, through NSS and NCC units, St. Johns Ambulance and Alumni Association to involve students in a number of activities for social cause. Students participating in such activities develop social responsibility, human values, leadership, communication and teamwork skills. The activities are conducted through

- Programs on environmental and health awareness like infectious diseases and hygiene. Plantation, plantlet distribution in locality, poster exhibition, Swachh Bharat Abhyyan, rally, webinar on single-use plastic, cyber-crime, stress management, motivational interaction with COVID warrior, etc.
- Observation of Days of National and International importance [Independence Day, Republic Day, World Environment Day, Rabindra Jayanti, Netaji Jayanti (Desh Prem Divas), Youth Day (Vivekananda Jayanti), Earth Day, International Mother Language Day, International day of Indigenous Population] in the college.
- Religious festivals like Saraswati Puja, Iftar, Raksha Bandhan, Vijaya Sammilani, to maintain social harmony.
- Regular publication of wall magazines, e-magazines from the departments.

All the students and stakeholders of the college participate spontaneously in these programs, reflecting a strong institutional integrity with society.

2. Maintenance of the freshwater pond biodiversity and using it for surface water preservation:

- The college campus was used to be in waterlogged condition for days in the rainy season every year, leading to loss of working days and valuable office documents and infrastructure degradation.
- The pond in the campus has been maintained with a priority on biodiversity conservation regular cleaning and quality control. The slope has been maintained in such a way, so that it can act as a reservoir of overflowed surface rainwater, during heavy rainfall.

For this practice, in addition to aesthetic and ecological aspect, water of the pond is directly used to maintain green cover of the campus in dry season. The classes & examinations are not interrupted due to waterlogging any more.

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	<p>Narasinha Dutt College is a degree college of Howrah, the twin city of Kolkata, on the west bank of river Ganges. The century-old academic institution has a vision of imparting higher education to the people of all levels of the society. The courses offered by the institution are basically classified into three streams - Science, Humanities and Commerce. In this way, the college clearly depicts a multidisciplinary mode of teaching, with some limitations. Institution offers programmes and courses under Choice Based Credit System(CBCS). We have a strong belief that academic programs should include Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary courses for better</p>
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	<p>exposure of the students with optimum level of flexibility to choose elective courses. The institution is affiliated with the University of Calcutta, West Bengal. Hence, it has to follow the guidelines prescribed by the university as mandated. As a result, independent curricular planning to include multidisciplinary subjects as per National Education Policy 2020 is not admissible. However, the college is preparing itself to evolve into a better multidisciplinary institution with more flexibility, if there is any upgraded guideline from the affiliating university. To promote a multidisciplinary academic approach, the institution publishes two multidisciplinary journals. One is “Journal of Commerce, Arts and Science (JOCAS)” published through online & print version and another one is NDC E-BIOS (online journal on Biological Sciences). Both the journals are peer-reviewed and dedicated to publish original/review papers of multidisciplinary aspects.</p>
<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>Under the Digital India Programme, National Academic Depository is a government endeavor to prepare an online repository for all kinds of academic awards for a particular person. For this purpose, the National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal has been integrated into the nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform. Institute is well aware about all these developments in National Educational Policy. Being an affiliated college, our institution has to follow the syllabi and the programs prescribed by the University of Calcutta. University centrally conducts the end-semester examination and awards the degree to the students. The total marks/credits are in the custody of the affiliating university and the college has no scope to keep that in possession. Moreover, college is not permitted to allow any students for free entry or exit except that is permitted by the choice-based credit system (CBCS) system. In addition, the college has no autonomy to design the programs, except the add-on/ certificate courses. So, initiation and maintenance of Academic Bank of Credit is not permissible for the institution. However, if the affiliating university changes the regulation and allows it to be actively engaged in the National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system, institutions will be all the needful accordingly.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>There is a huge skill gap, which has impacts on the</p>

	<p>employability of the students. Narasinha Dutt College focuses on the training and development of the students and recognizes the role of education in providing useful skills. The National Education Policy 2020 initiates the educational ecosystem to improve the employability of future generations. The Choice Based Credit System enables the students of the college to be skill developed as per the syllabus, especially through Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) papers. In addition, institutions offer few certificate/Add-on courses to develop skills in students. To promote vocational education UGC has introduced DDU KAUSHAL KENDRA (DDUKK) and B. Voc. Programmes for creation of work-ready skilled manpower on a large scale. The college tries to make an effort to introduce Vocational programs based on the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF). Keeping this in view, a MoU has been signed with the Sector Development Council for vocational courses on security training for the students.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>The institution encourages learning of Indian regional language by offering AECC (Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course) in Bengali. In addition, traditional languages like Sanskrit, Urdu are also taught as Core Courses. Lectures are delivered in bilingual mode (English and Bengali, Bengali and Sanskrit and Bengali-Urdu). Students studying Bengali receive class teaching in Bengali, students studying Sanskrit receive their lectures in Bengali and Sanskrit, students studying Urdu receive lectures in Hindi/English and Urdu, while others receive lectures in English and Bengali. Curriculum included in Anthropology teaches the students about the progression of human civilization in the Indian subcontinent. All the programs have one or two courses during the course of 6 semesters with an integrated Indian knowledge system. All the offline and online Cultural programs, events, webinars, seminars, which are regularly organized by college, to make the students understand the cultural values of India and literary heritage of Bengal as well.</p>
<p>5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>Narasinha Dutt College offers programs across Humanities, Science, and Commerce. All these programmes are offered as outcomes-based education (OBE) as designed by the affiliating university. College has implemented outcome-based education</p>

All courses are designed with outcome, centered on cognitive abilities like Understanding, Remembering, Analyses, Application, Evaluation, and Creation. In addition to domain-specific skills, learning outcomes at all levels ensure social responsibility and ethics, as well as entrepreneurial skills. In this way, the students will come forward to contribute for the sustainable social, environmental and economic growth of the nation. The Course Objectives (COs) are also aligned to the PO-PSO philosophy of education. All course syllabi have been designed with due consideration to Socio-economic growth with human values to apply the spirit of National Education Policy.</p>
6. Distance education/online education:	<p>During the worldwide Covid-19 pandemic, educational institutions have increasingly been involved in online systems, using digital platforms for engaging classes, online evaluations, conducting webinars, online conferences and meetings. Keeping aside the negative impact of lack of face-to-face learning, college adapted to the online education system, which has broken the geographical barriers creating interaction of experts and students from distant places. Due to the experience gained during the closure period of Covid-19, access to online academic resources and students is no longer a constraint.</p>

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

As the Institution is affiliated under University of Calcutta, the curriculum is implemented at undergraduate as well as post graduate level in accordance to the syllabus and academic calendar designed by the university. From the entry level all students are informed about the CBCS mode of learning with proper demonstrations in the following classes.

A Master Routine is framed for all departments showing Honours and general classes for all semesters as well as core course, generic elective, ability enhancement compulsory course, skill enhancement course and Discipline specific elective course for CBCS system.. The master routine indicates rooms, allotted teachers for classes indicated.

In case of post graduate departments (English and Mathematics) the time table shows both under graduate and post graduate classes effectively.

The curriculum for under graduate and post graduate courses is accordingly distributed among the faculty members and taught effectively.

Students are encouraged to participate in seminars, poster presentation, debate conducted by the departments. The students are given opportunity to speak on topics under their syllabus thereby encouraging them for an in-depth study of topics in the curriculum.

Regular mentoring and by conducting parent –teacher meeting, parental involvement in the ward's progress is duly considered.

Several departments conduct Field visits, excursions, Study tour where students gain an opportunity to link up their theoretical knowledge with practical experience related to curriculum. Through Project work/ Internships the faculty helps the students to find the relevance in learning.

The academic calendar for both under graduate and post graduate courses prepared by affiliating university is followed by the institution and uploaded in college website for the students and circulated through prospectus.

Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is conducted for the odd and even semester for each of the core course, Generic elective, Skill enhancement course, Discipline specific course, and AECC papers as per university circular.

The various ways in which CIE is operative in the college include –

Class tests and Tutorials, home assignments, Syllabus oriented Project preparation, Syllabus oriented paper presentation, Compulsory field work for students of Anthropology, Botany, Zoology etc, conducting mock oral tests and viva voce examination for the students. For field work the individual department conducts departmental meeting and fixes the dates. The students are informed accordingly.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

Student centric methods like experimental learning and problem solving methodologies are an integral part of the curricula that are taught by the teachers in the classroom in the college.

The following measures have been adopted by the institution to make teaching learning process more student-centric

1. Experience based learning:

Students are encouraged in experiential learning through faculty guided project works under the mentor-mentee system. This practice also promotes teamwork which is an essential element for students to learn to be successful in future.

Educational tours are also arranged by departments for encouraging experimental learning and participative learning.

Teachers are also mentoring the students to interact with them and assisting them to overcome their difficulties regarding the learning process and advising them about infrastructural supports like library facilities, scopes for higher studies and job opportunities, availability of various scholarships etc. as a student centric method.

Students are encouraged express their creative ideas to the departmental wall Magazine and E-magazine published from the college.

Due to the COVID-19 mediated pandemic situation, in this academic year (2020-21), there was a huge transformation from offline to online activities. So, the students were trained to develop the skill to use online platforms e.g Google Meet, video editing software, ICT tools like Power Point presentation. Using these skill, the students successfully organized Teachers' Day, Fresher's Welcome in Online mode in departmental level, made creative Power Point presentations for student seminar, science club activities,

created cultural/educational Videos for College You Tube channel.

2. Participative learning

Teachers encourage students to interact during class discussions for ensuring participative learning. Group discussions and students' presentations, students' seminars, project evaluations etc. are held during the semesters and also during the Tutorial Assessment for encouraging participative learnings.

Mentoring sessions are held on a frequent basis for the benefit of our students.

Parents Teachers Meetings are conducted to keep the guardians informed on the progress of their wards. Students are encouraged to join various webinars to improve their knowledge/skills and inter/intra college Quiz/Essay/photography competition. This information is shared through the Student WhatsApp Group by the faculty members on a regular basis.

3. Problem-solving methodologies

Internal and Tutorial assessments are designed to enhance the analytical and problem-solving skills of the students.

During the pandemic period, online interactive classes had been taken using online platforms like google meets and online study materials were provided to the students. Internal assessments were also arranged in online mode.

To help students develop their analytical and problem-solving skills, students are given different assignments periodically and solutions are explained by faculties afterward. WhatsApp groups at different levels of the students were created, where students are regularly informed about different academic aspects and can have direct interaction with teachers/mentors too.

Some add-on courses have been initiated from college to train them as professionally equipped manpower.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Students' evaluation through different tests/examinations is an integral part of college education. Being an affiliated college to the University of Calcutta, the institution has to follow the rules and regulation of the university for the overall assessment and evaluation process. The directives are communicated to the students. Internal assessment has an important role to play for CBCS method. In the session 2020-21, due to the Pandemic situation all the Internal Examinations were held in online mode as directed by the University. In this academic year, college provided information about methods and modalities to all students for Online Internal Assessment of examination.

Two Internal assessments were conducted, one for even semesters and one for odd semesters. According to the affiliating University, Internal assessments are assigned with 10 marks for each paper along with 10 marks for regular attendance under CBCS system. These examinations were conducted online by providing question papers of recommended marks by Board of Studies of university, through the links of Google workspace. Scanned answer sheets were and properly renamed PDF (with semester, roll number, paper code, etc) were mailed or uploaded by the students, which were transparently evaluated by all faculty members. Academic Council of the college supervises the process of conducting Internal Assessments and Tutorial Assessments to ensure transparency and robustness of this process.

The subject teacher briefs the students in the classroom about their attendance and performance in the

internal examinations. Students are free to interact with the teacher to resolve grievances if any, regarding the assessment.

The students can observe the soft copies of evaluated answer scripts which are preserved safely by the respective Department. If there is any difference or discrepancy in their marks, it can immediately be rectified before uploading to the University Exam Portal.

The Internal Assessment marks and attendance percentage obtained by the students are entered periodically in Calcutta University Exam Portal in a semester. Schedule of Internal Exams, Academic Calendar is strictly followed. Dates for the internal Examinations are notified by the College in website/students departmental WhatsApp groups in advance.

For redressal of grievances of the students and other stake holders of the college, there is a Grievance Redressal Cell, duly constituted in the Teachers' Council of the college. Students can also state their problems to their teacher-mentors and student representatives.

Internal assessment of the institution has been conducted in a regular systematic manner, which ensures efficient and timely completion of the assessments.

All the departments of the college are always in touch with their stakeholders like students, parents and alumni. During the COVID-19 pandemic, when the students had problems to upload/submit the answer scripts, all the teachers and staff members of the institution were available all the time to help the students to solve the issues through telephone, WhatsApp, departmental mails and mentoring sessions.

Teacher-student relation has become friendly and trustworthy for the mentoring system in the college. As a result, almost all problems are solved with the able dealing from the mentor-mentee interactions. So, grievances related to the transparency of the internal/university examination are seldomly raised. When technical problems were encountered in case of online system of examination, such grievances are solved immediately by the department, technical team and administration of the institution, before registering the issue to the Grievance Redressal subcommittee/cell of college.

Response:

Being an affiliated college, the institution follows the prescribed curriculum of university for all program. At UG level, there are 3 General Degree Programs, 17 Honours Degree Programs and 2 PG Degree Programme running successfully. Every undergraduate Honours program has 14 different core courses, four Skill enhancement (SEC) courses, four discipline specific elective (DSE) courses and two Ability Enhancement Compulsory (AECC) courses. All of the undergraduate General Degree Program offers the choice of three General Elective (GE) subjects, each elective subject with four core courses, four Skill Enhancement Courses, two Discipline Specific Electives and two Ability Enhancement Compulsory

Courses. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) are offered for Bengali and English languages only. Arts General course has one Language Core (LCC) Course.

At the beginning of every academic year, the departments distribute syllabus to the faculties with a focus on Programme Outcomes (POs), Programmes Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes(COs). The programme outcomes for every course offered in every subject is displayed on the college website. The primary objective of a specific course is communicated and explained to the students by the faculty members at the beginning of an academic session.

College website and prospectus provide the important information about all the programmes and courses, fee structures, details teaching and non-teaching staff and other aspects.

Proper evaluation of the attainment of learners' outcomes are the key factors, providing a benchmark to understand how far the institution has succeeded in accomplishing its purpose. For this, following methods are followed to carry out a continuous and comprehensive evaluation of learning outcomes:

1. CONTINUOUS EVALUATION OF THE STUDENTS –

Continuous evaluation of the students are conducted through regular interactive classes, class tests, internal examinations, etc. The irregular students are allowed to appear in examination after submission of satisfactory documents showing cause of irregularity. Results are analysed through student-mentoring. The overall learning outcomes are often evaluated through students' assignments, reports, projects and seminar presentations, which helps to assess the skill and aptitude of acquired by the students.

2. STUDENTS' FEEDBACK– Online feedbacks are collected regularly from the students in a structured questionnaire on curriculum and learning experience, to know the students' satisfaction level for further improvement at institution.

3. PARENT-TEACHER MEETING AND PARENT FEEDBACK– Parent-teachers meetings are regularly conducted by the Departments, where teachers discuss with parents about the betterment of their wards, with explanations and suggestions. Parents' feedback reports are also collected to improve the program and course outcomes.

4. ACADEMIC AUDIT OF THE INSTITUTION – Academic audit of the institution (internal/external) had conducted by the IQAC, on the basis of the seven criteria of NAAC. The valuable audit reports are approved by the institution after review by experts. The inputs of the academic audit are circulated to the departments, which are communicated to the stakeholders accordingly.

5. STUDENT SATISFACTION SURVEY – This survey is conducted centrally, with a structured questionnaire as per NAAC guidelines. Its result is further analyzed and actions are taken at institution level to attain better satisfaction level of the students.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

The institute has taken major initiatives to create suitable ecosystem for creation of innovative knowledge and transfer of them. The institute encourages teachers for research activities and provides all the administrative and infrastructural facilities for the applications of research grants. Importantly, the institute has highly talented and motivated faculty members in all the streams including science, arts and commerce, which is reflected in the number of research grants received by them during the last five years.

The faculty members also published significant number of papers in peer reviewed journals, books and book chapters. The institution has a separate research and development committee to record publications, participation in seminars and symposia and other research activities performed by the teachers. Certain amount of fund is allocated to provide financial assistance to the interested teachers through this committee. The committee encourages the faculty members by felicitating them for their research works.

The institution is successfully publishing two research journals JOCAS and NDC-E BIOS. The journals are in the process of acquiring ISSN number and is expecting to get them shortly. Apart from research journals, the institute regularly publishes the magazine "Prabaha" to disseminate the literary writings of the teachers and students. The institute regularly organizes state, national and international level seminars and webinars. The faculty members are supported by providing study leave and extra ordinary leave to pursue

Ph.D and postdoctoral research works.

The institute encourages the faculty members to attend OP, RC, FDP and short-term courses, for which duty leaves were sanctioned to the respective faculty members. Students and teachers of plant science are regularly exposed to the different levels of biodiversity, even in the aquatic ecosystem resulting publication in the college journal JOCAS. A rare fern *Ophioglossum* has been found to grow in the campus, which had attracted the attention of research workers of Botanical Science. The faculty members of plant and animal sciences are engaged in green audit in the campus.

The postgraduate departments encourage and prepare the students to pursue Ph.D. in future by conducting project work. Moreover, both the UG and PG the departments organizes seminars/special lectures and webinars to make the students aware of the current research works in s so that the students get motivated for research in their future endeavor. Different departments organizes field trips, excursions, industry visit and research institute visit to impart knowledge among the students outside the classroom.

Students of almost all departments publish wall magazines regularly. During pandemic period, the institute had developed the ecosystem to disseminate the knowledge through online classes and by creating its own YouTube channel, where the video lectures from the faculty members were uploaded.

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3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

Over the last five years the institution has carried out numerous extension activities for the welfare of the neighborhood community and to spread awareness among the students and molding their minds for the future through holistic and inclusive approach. Free health checkup OPD in every month on the first Wednesday was organized in collaboration with Howrah Municipal Corporation.

The Bio-social profile of the foundry workers of the area was evaluated. Sit-n-draw competitions for the children of the adjoining areas were organized in several academic sessions. Free of cost medicine distribution was organized for the students, staff of the college and nearby slum dwellers/ industrial workers by NSS unit of the College in collaboration with Howrah Municipal Corporation (Health Department).

Cleaning program in the local area near college campus and poster competition among students on Environmental Pollution were organized by NSS in collaboration of Belilious Tennis Club, Howrah.

Eye check-up and first aid duties were organized by St. John Ambulance Nursing Division, Narasinha Dutt College in collaboration with Peerless Hospital, Kolkata.

Every year Blood Donation Camp was organized frequently by NCC, NSS units & Alumni Association, during the last five years.

NCC unit organized Water Body Cleaning in outside the campus and tree plantation under the scheme Swachh Bharat Mission.

Voluntary services were provided during the festivals like Durga Puja, Kali Puja, etc. in local areas by NCC unit in collaboration with West Bengal Police, Kolkata Police and local clubs.

Legal awareness Seminar program on “Gender Sensitivity and Gender Equity” with students was organized in collaboration with rising voice foundation NGO. Students participated in extension activities including observation of anti-tobacco day, anti-drug day, Swachh Bharat Mission, AIDS awareness program through 2 Bengal girls BN NCC.

During the lockdown period the institution made temporary arrangements in classrooms to offer shelter to the homeless from the surrounding areas. In pandemic the institute performed extension activities and awareness programs through online mode. For examples, observation of World Environment Day, National Science Day, International Mother Language Day, Doctors’ Day, Diabetes Day, Cancer Day, Water Day, Mango Day, Earth Day and others.

Online webinars were organized on prevention of sexual harassment, career counseling for students and on value education. As the world was trying to cope up with the new normal, the college, shifted from online to the offline mode of functioning so that the extension and outreach activities, as well as sensitizing students to social issues and encouraging them to be a part of the social cause, were continued. Value education cell was established and special offline two days lecture series was organized on value education.

Plantation was practiced on offline observation of world environment day. A rally was organized by NCC unit in collaboration with Bantra PS in connection with the awareness program of making Howrah plastic free. National tobacco control program in collaboration with district tobacco control cell, Howrah and poster campaigning on world cancer awareness day were also organized to sensitize students about these

alarming health issues.

Till present, the total number of life members of this association is 63 and that for general members is 312, which is in a rising stage.

However, in pandemic situation activities of the association could not take place, as the campus was not open for long time. In the virtual platform, a state level webinar was jointly conducted the association and IQAC, on 10.9.2021. Reputed Alumni Dr. Premananda Bharati of Indian Statistical Institute was the resource person. An online 3-day Yoga Workshop (28.9.2021 to 30.9.2021) was organised in presence of instructor Smt. Jayasree Sarkar (Alumni member).

After reopening of campus, a cleaning programme was organized by the association in collaboration with NSS unit of the college in December, 2021.

The magazine of the association "Darpan" was published by on April, 2022.

Dr. Lipi Das (Ex-student and ex-faculty, Secretary of the Alumni Association), has provided fund for scholarship for the top scorers of B. Sc., Bioscience General.

A cleaning programme of the of the Playground in College Campus was conducted on 19.10.2021, as on the Covid situation closure of the College, it had been turned up into a mess.

A Free "HEALTH CHECK-UP CAMP" was organized by the association on 26.8.2022, at the College. The Camp was conducted by the Medical Professionals of 'NARAYANA SUPERSPECIALITY HOSPITAL'. The parameters checked there were: (a) Weight, (b) Blood Pressure, (c) Random Blood Sugar, (d) E.C.G., (e) Basic Eye Check-up, (f) Dietitian Consultation and (g) Doctor's Consultation. A total of 167 persons (Students, Faculty Members and Non-Teaching Staffs), were checked in the camp.

A 'BLOOD DONATION CAMP' was organised on 21.9.2022. at the College Campus, was conducted by "Nilratan Sarkar Medical College Blood Bank". In this camp, a total of 46 donors donated blood.

A "CANCER AWARENESS CAMP " for the female students was by the association on 25.11.2022. The camp was conducted by the Oncology Unit of "NARAYANA SUPERSPECIALITY HOSPITAL" , in presence of the resource person, Dr. Dipanjan Majumdar.

6.1.1 The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participation in the institutional governance

Response:

Narasinha Dutt College, established in 1924, has stepped into her centenary year, and occupies a position as one of the leading educational institutions in Howrah district of West Bengal. Currently the institution offers 22 regular undergraduate courses, and 2 post graduate courses. The Institution's policy making is based on overall Inclusiveness and holistic viewpoint. In respect to the evolving mode of educational system, even during the COVID-19 pandemic situation, when on-campus activities remain suspended, the college continued in its endeavor to achieve the following: Enriched functioning of the technical cell to face the challenges of the online system; An official YouTube channel (N.D college online classes) and a Facebook page was opened prior to lockdown to facilitate interaction for academic and co-curricular needs amongst students, teachers, alumni, stakeholders and staff members. For self-financed courses, to facilitate the availability of lectures to the students at a later date, Google Space was purchased to enable recording of the lectures which were delivered through online mode. The website of the college has become more user-friendly. Governing Body and IQAC of the college, along with different cell and sub-committees regulates the academics and holistic activities with the help of teaching and non-teaching members of the college.

A number of working units like different committee, subcommittee, cells and club (example: Science Club, Art and Culture Club) have been instituted as per NAAC, UGC and University guidelines in consultation with Governing Body, Principal and Teacher's Council. Teachers are selected as conveners of the different constituted committee, subcommittees /cells. In each subcommittee/ cell, Principal is the Chairperson. Science club These units are involved to conduct different developmental and creative activities of the college round the year in a continuous and coordinated manner. Example: Decentralization and Participative Management through the activities of Service Book Committee (A complete team, made up of teachers and non-teaching staff members, where Principal the Convener) and decentralized PF committee where each individual is provided with a unique ID and password.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Response:

Implementation of examination and evaluation process based on strategic plan by the institution: The teachers and non-teaching staff members were in constant touch with the students, especially in during pandemic situation with online mode of teaching-learning-evaluation. The students are to appear in internal and final examinations. For this, all the departments and technical team of the college was fully dedicated as a team, so that all students can appear in the online examinations through the procedures like form filling, receiving of admit card, appearing in internal and university examinations and getting the result in time. The internal and final examinations were conducted by the college centrally, providing links to get question papers and uploading answer scripts in time. Prior to that, all the students were well informed and explained about the process in the online mode. Hence, a large number of students successfully appeared in the examinations and passed in the examinations. In case of practical examinations, science departments conducted the examinations with expertise, so that not a single student becomes absent. All the marks were uploaded after proper evaluation of the answer scripts. It was particularly possible by thorough mentoring process by all departments.

The administrative diagram for functional organization (organogram) demonstrates the decentralized structural configuration. The overall administration is a synchronized effort of the Principal madam, with teaching as well as non-teaching staff and the students, in a cooperative way with participation from of all the stakeholders for the achievement of a common goal. All aspects of academic, maintenance, financial and developmental points have to be organized in order to achieve the desired objective. Principal, the Head of the institution supervises the institution with the help of Bursar. The Internal Quality of the academic institution is under the supervision of the coordinator of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Principal also looks after the all Class II & Class IV level non-teaching staff members. Different committees, sub-committees are formed which include Publication sub-committee, Library sub-committee, sports sub-committee, Seminar and cultural sub-committee, Routine subcommittee, etc. There are different Cells under IQAC like documentation cell, Value Education Cell, Advisory Cell. Publication cell, etc. There is another important characteristic of the Organogram, which is the major stakeholders like the students, parents, guardians, alumnae, etc.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The institution has a well-coordinated system of appraisal of the teachers. Each faculty has to fill up an appraisal book which records the teaching days, details of leave, other academic and administrative assignments performed by the faculty. The duty leaves include university confidential assignments, attendance in seminars, paper presentation in seminar/conferences, attending faculty development programs and short-term courses. Medical leave, earn leave and any other relevant information is also recorded in the appraisal book. At the end of the academic year, the filled in appraisal books are submitted to the Principal and duly endorsed. The IQAC coordinator and the convener of the faculty entitlement committee duly checks and suggest necessary changes in the career advancement scheme file of the faculties who have their promotion due. Once the career advancement files are endorsed by the Convener of Faculty entitlement Committee and IQAC coordinator, Principal follows the proper protocol as directed by State Government for the advancement in the next stage namely Assistant Professor Stage I to II, II to III, and Assistant Professor Stage III to Associate Professor. In the self-appraisal record, all the activities are recorded in hours as per guidelines of UGC for career advancement. The teachers can apply for attending FDPs, STCs, seminars and conferences in proper format to the Principal. The Service Books of the teachers both substantive and State Aided College Teachers are maintained by Service Book Committee. The entire details of leave, accumulation of leaves, fixation memos are meticulously maintained by the Service Book Committee till the retirement and even after for post-retirement benefits of pensioners when Government issues any orders related to financial augmentation. All the necessary documents are maintained by the college administration either in Hard copy with the Service Book Committee or in soft copy version with the administrative office.

The administration takes adequate proactive measures in providing welfare measures depending on the

situation. The Provident Fund of all the staff of the college can access online through a unique ID Password provided by the college authority. In case of Loan or Non- Refundable Withdrawal the members can self-check the PF status and take decision accordingly regarding withdrawal either in form of loan or total withdrawal. The willing member then has to apply to the PF committee for approval and the disbursement takes place after following procedural directives. The Teachers council also arranges for farewell for the retired employees on the last day of the service period. The council also takes proactive steps and stand by their members during crisis period of the members by arranging for financial help and other help. Besides, in case of emergencies welfare activity and financial help is executed through Principal's Relief Fund. Employees' Welfare fund is also managed by an executive committee consisting of teaching and administrative staff which provides financial relief to the family members in case of any misfortune and also after retirement from service.

The Laboratory based subjects have a different fee structure. The security deposit of the students are refunded once they pass out of the college. For the pandemic situation concession in application, and other relevant fees were given, as formulated by Governing body of the Institute. Fundraiser in departmental reunions is raised by alumni association through life and annual membership. One-time contribution of Alumni is also received. Alumni, retired faculty and family members of deceased faculty also institute scholarship and fellowship in appreciation of their long association with the institute.

1. The Practice

Conducting awareness programs on vector-borne disease, women's health.

Arranging OPD health check-ups for students, staff and migrant labors of locality inside the college, respiratory health & eye check-up outside the campus, Thalassemia detection camp, blood donation, motivational webinar during pandemic, etc.

Observation of Independence Day, Republic Day, World Environment Day, Rabindra Jayanti, Netaji Jayanti, Youth Day (Vivekananda Jayanti), Earth Day, International Mother Language Day in the college.

Organizing plantation, plantlet distribution in locality, poster exhibition on environment and health, Swachh Bharat Abhyaan within and outside the campus, students' webinar on single-use plastic, motivational interaction with COVID warrior, etc.

Organizing interactive session on "How to take care of your child" for the mothers of nearby slum area.

Distribution of garments among local laborers and donation of relief fund to natural disaster-stricken areas.

To motivate the children of local area by conducting sports and sit & draw competition.

Organizing rally for raising voice against terrorism, to aware people about Coronavirus and vector-borne diseases.

Solid and E-waste management and maintenance of mostly paperless office.

1.a) Problems Encountered: In the CBCS mode of curriculum, students get less time to involve themselves for social causes.

b) Resources Required: Some amount of fund, cooperation from the community and motivation in students with active involvement.

1.Evidence of Success

Spontaneous involvement and participation of the students.

Active participation of the students in different kinds of activities, observations and social awareness program.

Regular publication of wall magazines, e-magazines also from all the departments.

Reflection of peaceful social harmony during Saraswati Puja, Ramzan Namaz and Raksha Bandhan conducted in campus.

PRACTICE II

1. Title of the practice: Maintenance of the freshwater pond biodiversity and using it for surface water preservation

1. The context: Narasinha Dutt College is situated in central Howrah. The nomenclature has the origin from the Bengali word “haor”, which means swampy low land, where water and mud is accumulated. For this prevailing geomorphological character, the college campus was used to be in waterlogged condition for days in the rainy season every year, leading to loss of working days and valuable office documents and infrastructure degradation. It was a seasonal situation, for which the stakeholders had to face problems.

In the campus, there is a freshwater pond, with rich biodiversity, adding to the beauty of its landscape. To overcome the waterlogging problem, the administration made a policy to use this water body by its proper maintenance.

1.Objectives

- 1.To maintain the freshwater pond in the campus with appropriate planning, to use its water to maintain the green cover and garden, specifically in dry season.
- 2.To use the pond as a reservoir of overflowed surface rainwater of the campus, to get rid off recurring seasonal waterlogging condition during monsoon.
- 3.To augment the aesthetic effect of the ambience of the campus.
- 4.To have contribution in aquatic biodiversity conservation, maintaining ecological balance.

1. The Practice

1. The pond in the campus has been maintained with regular cleaning activities.
2. The quality of freshwater is monitored by routine check-up of the parameters like dissolved Oxygen level and Biological Oxygen Demand (BOD), for confirmation of the suitability of water quality to sustain aquatic biodiversity.
3. The biodiversity register comprising of aquatic plants, phytoplanktons, fishes, amphibians, etc. are regularly updated, to detect any disturbance in ecological food web and its control.
4. The slope has been maintained in such a way, so that it can act as a reservoir of overflowed surface rainwater, during heavy rainfall.

1.a) Problems Encountered : There were some difficulties to make the pondwater usable for the maintenance of the green cover within college campus. During Pandemic, the total aquatic ecosystem was disturbed, specially after the cyclone “Amphan”. However, the whole thing was restored with pwithin limited period of time.

b) Resources Required: Some fund and manpower to clean and maintain the pond. The quality of water is monitored by students by estimating its dissolved Oxygen and BOD.

1. Evidence of Success

1. The aquatic ecosystem of pond has become the home of different floating, submerged & emerged plants and several types of fishes, insects and amphibians, being an example of the practice of biodiversity conservation within campus, with direct involvement of all stakeholders.
2. The water of the pond is directly used to maintain the plants in the campus in dry season.
3. The classes & examination are not interrupted due to waterlogging in the campus and the problem has been distinctly minimized.

Narasinha Dutt College is a century-old heritage institution, situated in the industrial belt of Howrah, the twin city of Kolkata, the former capital of British-ruled India. It was the only higher education of Howrah district during the time of its inception. From the starting point of the journey, the institution has been imparting high-quality, inclusive education to society with the mission “Jnanat Parataram Nahi” (Nothing is superior knowledge). The college does not discriminate students based on socio-economic status and belief. The institution is open to all sections of society and help to achieve the dreams of the underprivileged.

Demographically, the college attracts a number of first-generation learners even from remote rural areas and migrant workers of local small-scale industrial manufacturing units. The learned faculty and skilled staff members of the college always motivate such students in their academic pursuits, explore their potential and guide them to showcase and achieve their full potential wise their capabilities. All the teachers work with focus and patience to reach this achievement. In this regard, the institution also focusses on the advanced learners of the various programs and courses offered by the college and guide them to achieve coveted careers as per their aspiration.

The institution offers a multiple stream platform at undergraduate level, with science, humanities, and commerce streams in a single college, with a peaceful academic ambience. Multilingual academic platform is another distinct character of the college, which offers undergraduate courses in a regional language (Bengali), an Indian language (Urdu), an ancient Indian language (Sanskrit) and a communicative foreign language (English). Such features have significant contribution in the achievements of the students.

Among the students in this co-educational institute, above 50% of enrolled students are girl students, an indicator of women empowerment. Science laboratories specially keeping in mind the safety of the students enrolled in chemistry department a centralized gas plant of LPG gas has been installed at a secluded corner from Chemistry department and the gas is supplied in the laboratories through designated pipelines.

A medicinal plant garden has been maintained in a specified corner of the college campus of both the classified categories based on life span i.e. annual, biennial and perennial. Medicinal plants belonging to herbs, shrub and trees are also in the medicinal garden.

The college enjoys an uninterrupted power back-up for all the wings of the college in case of power failure from supplying power grid.

The entire college campus is wi-fi enabled with internet facilities round the clock.

Publication of newsletter "WINDOWS", college magazine for students "PRABAHA", students magazine, alumni magazine "DARPAN", journals like JOCAS (multidisciplinary) and NDC E-BIOS (bio-science e-journal).

The college plays a role in maintaining social harmony in the local neighborhood by offering the premises for any religious function of the minority groups mainly for offering Namaaz during EID. The college also provided shelter to the homeless vagabonds of the area during lockdown imposed due to COVID 19 pandemic in 2020.

The institution has a round the year calendar for a number of outreach programs in collaboration with "AMRAGORI SOCIAL AND HUMANITARIAN ASSOCIATION" and inculcates a sense of empathy, awareness and social service inclination in the tender minds of the students to make them aware of the problems and marginalization faced by the underprivileged strata of the society. The college firmly instills the importance and necessity for the value of holistic education and empathy for the less privileged sections of society.

Active NCC (boys and girls wing) and NSS units of the college organize outreach programs for the surrounding neighborhood within 3.5km radius of the college through annual camps and different observance days.

Environmental and health awareness programs are held in collaboration with Internal Quality Assurance Cell and Internal Complaint Cell, Women Cell, NSS, Alumni association, St John's Ambulance, Science club

Additional Information :

The college being established in 1924 has just stepped into the centenary year. Year long celebration has been planned comprising of rallies, cultural programmes, inter college competitions with active involvement of all the stakeholders of the college. Governing Body, Members of the Founder Family, Alumni, District administration, elected members of the legislative assemblies have extended their whole -hearted support and cooperation.

Principal, Dr. Soma Bandyopadhyay has recently been felicitated in recognition of her contribution in Education sector by New Normal Education Leadership Summit and Awards 2023, for her visionary leadership during pandemic and post pandemic period.

The institute boasts of a rich repertoire of books, well-maintained medicinal garden, a well-maintained water body and landscape gardening. Sincere efforts are taken to integrate the students with various extracurricular and outreach activities to mould them into well balanced citizens of India.

The institute under the able leadership of Governing Body and Principal has been able to maintain and thus boasts of rich plant fossil depository, herbarium collection in department of Botany, primate skeletal museum, cultural artifacts of different ethnic groups in department of anthropology along with spectrophotometer in department of chemistry, autoclave, laminar airflow, incubator and high -end microscopes and other sophisticated instruments in different science departments.

Continuous monitoring of atmospheric bio-pollutants (pollen and spores) has been conducted with a 7-Day recording Volumetric Sampler (Burkard Manufacturing Co., Hertfordshire, United Kingdom). The device is placed in West Block rooftop to provide continuous hourly airborne pollen-spore record from 2017 (Except COVID period). The data generated is used to prepare allergenic pollen-spore calendar/list of college locality, to reflect the exact level exposure. The pollen-spore calendars/lists are locally distributed by students of NSS unit of college for awareness development about the seasonal exposure of airborne allergen. Peak expiratory flow rate (PEFR) is an indicator of the human respiratory function in response to environmental trigger in human, was measured in field survey by a portable peak flow meter, by the NSS unit students of college. The measurement was conducted among the boys of 10-15 years age, enrolled for training in Bengal Football Club, near college campus.

Concluding Remarks :

Narasinha Dutt College was accredited by NAAC in 2009 and subsequently, it was reaccredited in cycle earning rating of B++ in 2016. The Institute is more mindful of, and grateful for, the trust and responsibility invested in it to raise the bar when it comes to the holistic development of the students entrusted to its care.
